Our mission context: the area, people, places we serve **Now?** **Changes anticipated over the next five years?**
Now: The church serves a small village in a rural area close to the market town of Bridgnorth. The population is about 400. The congregation is drawn from local residents and those from further afield who appreciate traditional services. The village C of E primary school is an academy managed through the Bishop Anthony Trust.
Changes: There are plans to build a number of houses in the village although these are not expected to have a significant impact. A large residential estate (500 houses) is planned for the outskirts of Bridgnorth bordering on this parish which will possibly impact the primary school, traffic etc.

What we can learn / build on /develop
 We have been encouraged by the number of visitors to the church particularly during fund raising events, the increased number of weddings and baptisms and the links we have built with Morville School through providing a venue for end of term assemblies, plays and the Christingle event.

<p>Strengths Church has a beautiful location and is a historic building of interest. Services are provided on a regular basis. There is a strong bell ringing group. A free parish magazine is produced monthly and distributed by volunteers. Fund raising events bring the community and church together.</p>	<p>Weaknesses The congregation is both ageing and diminishing. Sunday morning services are not attractive to families due to competing events such as sports. Many people locally find it difficult to find time to support the church or "are not interested".</p>	<p>Opportunities Increase links with the Morville school to encourage families into church. Capitalise on the historic features of the church which are of interest to visitors. Good parking Proximity to the National Trust's Morville Hall which is a visitor attraction. New residential housing provides possibility of new church members.</p>	<p>Challenges Reliance on a reducing number of volunteers to fill the church offices and to undertake fund raising. Competing social activities on Sunday mean there is a need for different strategies to fund the church and enable it to survive. Attracting new residents to join the church.</p>
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People and Resources: Now? Anticipated? *Think about clergy and lay ministers, parish officers, new ministries, vocations, opportunities/needs for deployment etc*
 Currently we have a non stipendiary priest, organist, 2 acting churchwardens, treasurer, secretary and lay vice chair. Together with the bell captain and other members of the PCC these form the core team who manage the church and its activities. We would like to rotate offices although this is hard to achieve without additional members.

Our discernment of our way forward together as a parish/benefice **Our current vision for this parish/benefice in 5 years time**
 We would like our congregation to grow and seek opportunities to achieve this through encouraging visitors into church and strengthen our links with Morville Primary school. We wish to maintain weekly services and consider this can be achieved in the medium term but are dependent on the good offices of our priest.
