**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER 2023**

Aim and Purposes

Morville Parochial Church Council (PCC) has the responsibility of co-operating with the Team Rector and Team Vicar in promoting the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical, in the ecclesiastical parish.

Objectives and Activities

The PCC is committed to enabling as many people as possible to worship at our Church and to being part of our parish community at Morville. The PCC maintains an overview of worship throughout the parish and makes suggestions on how our services can involve the many groups that live in our parish. Our services and worship put faith into practice through prayer and scripture, music and sacrament.

When planning our activities for the year, we have considered the Charities Commission's guidance on public benefit and the supplementary guidance on charities for the advancement of religion. The PCC seeks to enable people in the parish to live out their faith as part of our parish community through:

- Worship and prayer; learning about the Gospel; and developing their knowledge and trust in Jesus.
- Provision of pastoral care for people living in the parish.
- Activities that bring the community together.

To facilitate this work, it is important that we maintain the fabric of the Church of St. Gregory the Great and its surrounding churchyard.

Achievements and Performance

Morville PCC has been keen to offer a range of weekly services over the course of the year which our community has found both beneficial and spiritually fulfilling. The weekly Sunday service is normally held at 11.15 am. The parish has been in a state of vacancy for a Team Vicar since September 2022. During this vacancy period we have held one Holy Communion and three Morning Prayer services each month. There are no Sunday services on the fifth Sundays when they occur. This year our services have been led by Anna Chaplain Jane Peeler and visiting clergy as and when available. Our Church Wardens, Mrs Janet Brick and Mr Tim Morris, have provided Morning Prayers services on the first and third Sunday of each month. Music is provided by our organist Mrs Alison Foxall who is an active member of the church community and for whose continued support we rely heavily.

The church is cleaned regularly, brasses are cleaned and flower arrangements provided. Refreshments are provided for the attending congregation after service on the second and fourth Sunday each month. All these tasks are carried out by the members of the PCC, congregation and the local community for which we are very grateful.

In addition there are several special services which include Easter, Christmas, St Gregory's Feast Day, Harvest Festival and Remembrance Sunday. Unfortunately, due to lack of clergy, no special services were held for Lent.

The Church has also been used by Morville C of E Primary School for special services and assemblies during the year. During the vacancy we have been fortunate to have Reverend Simon Boxall taking the place of Reverend Sarah Cawdell working with the school children. Morville PCC has supported the school by providing refreshments for the children and their families at the various assemblies, Harvest and Christmas events.

St. Gregory's Church does not hold a Sunday School at the present time but hopes to re-establish this in the future. To achieve this we need to encourage families with children into the church, and the school assemblies and services are the first steps towards doing this. This year two children have joined our congregation. They both enjoy signing the Lord's Prayer when they attend, and reading some lessons when possible

A Summer Fete was held again, this year including the school, and organised by Tim Morris. The proceeds were divided equally between the Morville Group of Churches and Morville School.

Morville Hall was not open to visitors during 2023 and, due to renovations, is unlikely to be open for some time, so we have not been able to raise any funds by providing teas to National Trust visitors to the Hall.

There is a regular bell ringing team, led by the Bell Tower Captain Ian Rowe, which supports the weekly services and holds other bell ringing events. Bells are rung for weddings and funerals on request. The bells of St Gregory's Church also attract bell ringers from other areas, an activity which helps to raise funds for the church.

Everyone is welcome to attend our regular services. There are 22 parishioners on the Church Electoral Roll, some of whom are not resident in the parish. Church attendance numbers vary week on week but averages about 12 adults and 2 children at normal Sunday services, then increasing significantly at special services held during the year. We have also welcomed members of the other churches in the Morville Group during this vacancy year.

As well as our regular services, we enable our community to celebrate and thank God at the milestones of the journey through life. Through baptism we thank God for the gift of life, in marriage public vows are exchanged with God's blessing and through funeral services friends and family express their grief and give thanks for the life which is now complete in this world and to commend the person into God's keeping. This year we have been able to celebrate three marriages but sadly no baptisms. We also held five funeral services at St Gregory's church during the year.

A newsletter is produced and delivered to all the homes in the four parishes within the Morville Group of Parishes. 315 copies are printed and distributed to local homes each month and 103 are provided by email, including some people who have left our parishes but enjoy hearing the news. The numbers increase to 320 at Easter, Christmas and special events when we have more visitors. The newsletter provides details of services to be held at Morville Group churches together with messages, local news and events. The aim is to include everyone, not just churchgoers. It is produced by Mrs Carol Skinner and distributed by local volunteers and is self-financing, relying on local advertising and the occasional donation.

The Morville Church website (www.morvillechurch.co.uk) provides information on our Church, its services and events as well as historical and background details that can be easily accessed by the public. We include an opportunity for users to donate to the church via the website.

The PCC continues to carry out Health and Safety requirements including risk assessments and emergency evacuation procedures when major events are held in the church and churchyard, in line with Ecclesiastical Insurance requirements and guidance. The PCC's Health and Safety Policy document was revised in line with Ecclesiastical Insurance guidance and reissued in a new format during 2022.

Sadly, thefts from the church continue, though fortunately restricted to the removal of paperback books only.

Deanery Synod

A member of the PCC sits on the deanery synod and reports back to the PCC at following meetings. This provides an important link between the parish and the wider structures of the Church.

Bridgnorth and Morville Parishes Team Council

Two PCC members currently sit on the Team Council who have an input into the decision making of the Bridgnorth and Morville Parishes Team Ministry. The council consists of representatives of the nine churches in the benefice and the team clergy. It co-ordinates the efforts of the churches in advancing the Kingdom of God, using available resources and spreading good practice whilst maintaining the appropriate core functions of the PCCs. The Council encourages co-operation between all the churches of the benefice, particularly in developing the Mission of the church, seeking to enable all members of the church to grow in stature as Christians and in fellowship with each other. There is a Team Office which provides administrative support to the clergy and PCCs. Morville PCC contributes to the incremental costs of the Team Office.

Through its Team Council representatives, the PCC has been appraised of progress on clergy recruitment in the Team Ministry. Throughout the year the Team Council has held discussions on recruitment of a Priest in Charge (in place of Team Rector). Morville PCC produced a draft parish profile setting out details of this parish and needs for future mission. A summary version was incorporated into the draft benefice profile. This process has continued throughout 2023 and was still in progress at the year end.

The matter of appropriate accommodation for the priest in charge has been an important pre-requisite of the recruitment effort. In February, Bishop Richard placed the benefice in suspension to allow consultation of the accommodation issue. The Diocese considered the existing Rectory (16, West Castle Street, Bridgnorth) did not meet current standards being too large and too expensive for an incumbent to run on a stipend. On 12 April, Bishop Richard gave notice to the Benefice Patrons and PCCs of his intention to sell the Rectory under section 5 of the Church Property Measure 2018 and to use the funds raised to acquire a replacement parsonage house. A consultation with the benefice patrons and PCCs took place and Morville PCC approved the proposal conditional on the Diocese seeking advice on repurposing the existing Rectory and the Diocese ring fencing any surplus arising from the sale for the benefit of the benefice. The matter was subsequently referred to the Church Commissioners who determined in September that the sale be allowed to proceed.

Pastoral Care

Pastoral care in the benefice has been carried out by Anna Chaplain Jane Peeler together with the other volunteering clergy during the year. This has been done through home visits including the celebration of Holy Communion when requested, support during sickness and bereavement and where necessary, through telephone calls. Our Church Warden Mrs Brick has also helped provided pastoral support to local families where possible together with other members of the Church community.

Reverend Simon Boxall has become a member of the Board of Governors at Morville Primary School where he holds regular assemblies in school. He also leads church events with the children and teachers each term.

Church Fabric and Furnishings

St Gregory the Great Church is a Grade 1 listed building (List Entry Number: 1053840) dating back to 1118.

The last quinquennial inspection was carried out in 2020 by the PCC's nominated architect. The report concluded that "The PCC have been instigating investigations, repairs and improvements since the last inspection. The church is generally in a good state of repair, but due to its age and size there are items needing attention now and others that are desirable." The major areas of work outstanding are redecoration of external rainwater goods, generally improved ventilation in the vestry including the WC and repointing accessible open joints and small voids in the external walls.

The tower parapet renovation work carried out in 2021 was subject to some rectification work which was completed in the summer to the church architect's satisfaction and the contractor's retention was paid. Roof repair work was undertaken in November to re-bed ridge tiles over the chancel and replace missing and broken tiles. The ground level on the path outside the church porch was raised to eliminate a high step and improve accessibility. Regular servicing work is undertaken on fire extinguishers, organ and lightning conductor.

The PCC has previously resolved to leave the asbestos, which is present in the boiler house (identified by the Asbestos Management Review in 2019), in situ as the room is locked and has suitable 'no entry' warning signs in place thus minimising any risk.

The PCC was pleased to add to the church furnishings a wooden cross carved and presented by Mr Trevor Jones of Morville – our thanks to Mr Jones.

Churchyard

Morville PCC is responsible for maintaining the churchyard surrounding the church building although it is not responsible for headstone repair. In past years, the PCC has received donations and legacies to assist in the churchyard maintenance. These have included the Warren family, Cooper family, Norfolk family, Rodgers family and Wadlow family. A plaque identifying the churchyard as containing a war grave (Mr G.T. Gregory died 1940) has been placed in the lychgate by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

Churchyard mowing was undertaken on a regular basis by our contractor, Martin Gretton which meant the churchyard continued to look well maintained throughout the year. Dead wooding was undertaken by a tree surgeon on the large Sycamore tree in the car park for safety reasons prior to the Four Churches Fete in July. We are grateful to Mr Eric Bunning for cutting the churchyard hedges. Working parties also took place during the year carrying out strimming and other ground maintenance work.

Financial Review

General Fund

There was an excess of payments over receipts of £1,015 for the year on the general fund. This compares to an excess of receipts over payments in 2022 of £7,798 which arose from exceptional receipts from a legacy (£5,000) and a listed places of worship grant (£1,870). Excluding these items, the comparable excess of receipts for 2022 was £928 indicating a reduction in the General Funds cash position of £1,943.

Excluding the exceptional items mentioned above, receipts have fallen in 2023 by £1,936 largely due to a fall in planned giving of £1,158 and a fall in fees for weddings and funerals of £918. The ongoing vacancies for clergy in Bridgnorth Team Ministry no doubt may have contributed to this decline.

Payments for the year amounted to £14,286 compared to £14,279 in 2022. In view of the declining income the parish offer for 2023 had been reduced by £2,000 to £5,000. This cost reduction was offset by the cost of electricity which increased by £700 (to £1,307), underbilling of churchyard mowing in 2022 of £400 and tree work of £180. Church maintenance this year mainly involved roof work amounting to £900 and the completion of the tower parapet repairs amounting to £733 including architect fees.

The PCC decided to maintain the level of charitable giving. Donations included the DEC Turkey/Syria earthquake disaster fund (£250), Royal British Legion (£208). The Cherish Fund (£88.50), Hereford Diocesan Bell Fund (£32), Shropshire Historic Churches Trust (£25) and Gulu Laptops (£84) following an appeal from Reverend Sarah Cawdell.

The general fund cash funds at the year end amounted to £23,677 (2022 £24,692) of which £17,889 was held on deposit (2022 £17,889). The interest on the deposit account is credited to the general fund.

Other Unrestricted Funds

There were no significant movements in these funds during the year.

Restricted Funds

There were no significant movements in these funds during the year. The PCC has three COIF Income Unit Investment Funds holding the assets of these funds. The net asset value of these investments as at 31st December 2023 is detailed on the Statement of Assets and Liabilities in the accounts section of this Report.

Morville Parish Charity Fund and Morville Church Charity Fund: The objectives of these two charities were established in the 16th and 17th centuries when several benefactors gave money to the church to benefit the poor in the community, the clergy and church. It was the task of the churchwardens to ensure that this was done. The responsibility subsequently moved to Morville Parish Council (Local Government Act 1894) where it remained until 1980.

Following agreement between the Morville Parish Council and the Charities Commission, the Morville Church Charity and the Morville Relief in Need Charity were established. The objectives of both funds remained unchanged from those originally given to the charity, that the interest generated by the investments must be used to benefit the church and vicar and people in need respectively. The Morville Church Charity Fund was managed by the PCC and the Morville Relief in Need Charity was managed in the local community.

Interest generated from the Morville Church Charity Fund is deposited in the PCC General Fund and used towards Church running costs

In 2019 the Morville Relief in Need Charity was closed as it was thought to be no longer required locally, and the PCC agreed to administer the funds, making donations to help people in need, both locally and further afield, but always in the spirit of the original gifts. This fund was named the Morville Parish Charity Fund. The sum of £16,674 was received at the end of 2019 and purchased 1169.19 COIF income units. Interest generated by this investment is held in a restricted bank account.

No donations were made to people in need in 2023 and the balance on the account currently stands at £1,100.08.

Preece Legacy Fund: St Gregory's Church received a legacy of £35,566.43 in October 2020. The bequest was made by the late Mrs Enid Rosemary Preece and was given specifically "*to Morville Church Council of St Gregory's Church Morville Bridgnorth Shropshire for the upkeep of St Gregory's Church*". The bequest is held in a restricted fund (Preece Legacy Fund).

At the PCC meeting on 20th July 2021 it was agreed that the legacy funds should be invested in COIF income units, with subsequent income generated held in the restricted deposit account for use by the PCC in accordance with the terms of the legacy. The investment was completed at the end of July 2021.

On 8th March 2022 the PCC agreed that the legacy received from Miss White should also be invested in COIF income units. 259.37 additional income units were purchased bringing the total holding in this account to 2067.57 units. Income generated in 2023 was £843 in dividends and £57 in interest.

Fund Balances: In summary, the bank balances carried forward as at 31st December 2023 were:

Unrestricted funds totalled £25,859 (£5,788 general fund, £17,890 deposit account, and the Bellingring Fund £2,182).

For restricted funds, the Bell Maintenance Fund ended the year at £6,976, the Morville Parish Charity Fund at £1,100 and the Preece Legacy Fund at £2,542.

COIF Income Unit Investment Funds: The net asset value of these investments as at 31st December 2023 was –

Morville Church Charity (942 units) £18,694.
Morville Parish Charity (1169.19 units) £23,203
Preece Legacy Fund (2067.57 units) £41,031.

Financial Policies

It is PCC policy to try to maintain a balance £20,000 of unrestricted funds for the following purposes

- a) £5,000 to be held in the Treasurers bank account to smooth out cash flow fluctuations during the financial year and to cover any unforeseen costs.
- b) £15,000, which equates to at least 12 months unrestricted payments where PCC income has decreased for any reason Also to cover emergency major repairs, prior to grants being made available.

The unrestricted funds at the year end amounted to a cash balance of £5,788 together with the deposit balance of £17,889. These funds exceeded the reserve policy amount however the excess is to cover the works from the last quinquennial inspection still to be completed. The 2024 budget indicates a further potential deficit for the coming year.

It is also PCC policy to invest the balance of our funds with CCLA whenever possible.

Volunteers

We would like to thank all the volunteers who work so hard to make our church such a warm and welcoming place. In particular, thanks must go to our church wardens, Mrs Brick and Mr Morris, for organising and leading lay services each month during the vacancy, and Mrs Brick for her support of the visiting clergy. Also thanks to the many volunteers who clean, provide flowers and refreshments and to Mrs Skinner and all concerned for the continuing production and distribution of the newsletter. Finally, thank you to our bell tower captain Mr Ian Rowe who opens and closes our church every day for the benefit of parishioners and visitors and for all the other support he provides to the PCC as well as leading the bellringing team.

Structure, Governance and Management

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation rules. At Morville, the membership of the PCC consists of the incumbent, Team Clergy, Churchwardens and members elected by those members of the congregation who are on the electoral roll of the Church.

All those who attend our services/members of the congregation are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC. The PCC members are responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish including deciding on how the funds of the PCC are to be spent. The PCC held five meetings during the year.

Relationships

Morville Church Building Trust: The Morville Church Building Trust (MCBT) was formed in 1994/95 at the instigation of the PCC. It works alongside but independent of the PCC and provides assistance to the PCC in funding the repairs to the church building and churchyard. It has made grants to maintain the fabric of the Church building and provides advice as required. Two members of Morville PCC, Mr Tim Heatley and Mr Simon Wadlow, are also Trustees of the Morville Church Building Trust.

The Trust's focus recently has been upon maintaining its financial reserves in order that it can provide grants to the PCC when major, unexpected repairs to the Church fabric occur. No grants were received from the MCBT during the year.

Legacies for the benefit of the MCBT are devoted and restricted entirely to the upkeep and preservation of the historic St Gregory's church building and grounds. Legacies for the benefit of the PCC are used for St Gregory's Church building, churchyard, upkeep and mission, in accordance with the benefactor's instructions and can be restricted to a specific purpose if the benefactor so instructs.

Administrative Information

St Gregory the Great Church is situated in the village of Morville, Shropshire near Bridgnorth. The church comes within the benefice of Bridgnorth and Morville Parishes Team Ministry which in turn is part of the Bridgnorth Deanery. The Deanery comes within the Archdeaconry of Ludlow of the Diocese of Hereford. Reverend Prebendary Simon Cawdell is Team Rector of the Team Ministry.

The Team Vicar for the parish was Revd Sarah Cawdell up to September 2022 when Revd Cawdell left the Team Ministry to undertake missionary work in Uganda. Since the start of the vacancy the Rural Dean, Revd Preb Mark Daborn, has undertaken incumbent responsibilities as necessary.

The Morville Parochial Church Council (PCC) is a body corporate (PCC Powers Measure 1956, Church Representation Rules 2020) and a charity currently excepted from registration with the Charity Commission.
